


YOU BE YOU!: THE KID'S **GUIDE TO GENDER, SEXUALITY, AND FAMILY**

This book contains explicit alternate gender ideologies; non-sexual nudity; inexplicit sexual activities; and alternate sexualities.

These body parts are shaped by the chromosomes you inherit from your parents. Chromosomes are like building guides. They're inside every cell of your body, and they tell your body how to grow. The X and Y chromosomes decide what sex parts you'll have. Most people with XY chromosomes have male parts, and most people with XX chromosomes have female parts.

But actually, not everyone is born with a body that fits these expectations of male or female. Some people have a mix of male and female parts, like a vapina and testes. Some people with XY chromosomes have female parts, and some people with XX chromosomes have male parts. Some people also have XXX or XXY chromosomes.


